Overview:

The following amendments are being proposed by Shalersville Township to address natural disaster situations where a residential structure is damaged or destroyed. The Township would like to amend the following sections consistently in their zoning book. This does not include new residential structures.

AMENDMENT 1

Proposed Amendment:

Sections 311(G); 321(G); 332(G); and add in it is entirety as Sections 342(F); 352(G) and 362(D)

G. Temporary building or trailer for dwelling purposes while a permanent dwelling is being reconstructed following a fire or other natural disaster for a period of one (1) year with option of one (1) additional year. The dwelling structure shall be removed from the premises after the two (2) year period, subject to Subsection 101.

Staff Comment:

This is revising an existing policy to clearly articulate the intent of the temporary trailer.

Staff Recommendation: Staff recommends approval as submitted.

This does not apply to new construction." We desire to change this in our zoning book for ARR, R2, Neighborhood Commercial, Mixed, and for existing homes only that are in Light Industrial Areas. We will be having a public meeting for this change when we have another item that requires a public meeting.

We also discussed expansion of the airport.

It was also suggested that the BZA have a meeting in January to recommission officers as well as meet with the Zoning Commission to discuss any amendments/laws that have been made in the previous year and discuss why those amendments/laws were made. This might help BZA understand the intent behind new laws and amendments.

**Amendment 1
Section 403.01 – Prohibited uses in Residential Districts**

Rationale: There is a growing concern over transient type of uses where people rent their homes for the weekend, week or month for vacations or as visitors. This transient use is not compatible to existing residential homes and the ability to rent for this purpose should be prohibited to protect both the privacy and values of properties that could possibly be affected by such a use.

Add the following Section 403.01 Prohibited uses in Residential Districts:

Section 403.01 Prohibited Uses in Residential Districts:

A. Transient Lodging

Staff Comments: This is a new Section to the code that just references transient lodging. Franklin Township goes further in amendment 2 to define what transient lodging is?

Staff Recommendations: Staff would recommend approval.

Amendment 2
Chapter 13 – Definitions

Rationale: There needs to be a definition of what “transient lodging” is.

Add the following definition to Chapter 13s:

Transient Lodging

A facility, building, or room(s) in which transient lodging is provided on a daily rate, weekly rate, monthly rate, or any other time period not specified by an executed lease offered to the general public.

Staff Comments: The township has provided a pretty good definition of what transient lodging is. This is a new definition to the zoning book.

Reviewing the Ohio Revised code and what other had for “transient lodging” is very similar:

ORC 3731.01

(2) "Transient hotel" means any structure consisting of one or more buildings, with more than five sleeping rooms, that is specifically constructed, kept, used, maintained, advertised, or held out to the public to be a place where sleeping accommodations are offered for pay to transient guests for a period of thirty days or less, including, but not limited to, such a structure denoted as a hotel, motel, motor hotel, lodge, motor lodge, bed and breakfast, or inn.

(6) "Transient" means not more than thirty days.

Also see Harpersville Township Ohio,

(c) "Hotel" means every establishment kept, used, maintained, advertised, or held out to the public to be a place where sleeping accommodations are offered to guest, regardless of whether such rooms are in one of several structures and/or regardless of whether rooms are accessible through the same keyed entry.

(d) "Transient Guests" means persons occupying a room or rooms for sleeping accommodation for less than thirty (30) consecutive days.

It appears that stays over 30 days would not constitute a hotel or transient use. So in essence this definition is to not allow short-term stays that would normally be consistent with a hotel use, especially in residential areas where hotels do not belong.

Staff Recommendations: Staff would recommend approval.

**Amendment 1
Section 608.2(B) – Conditional Uses**

Rationale: There is an applicant who would like to submit an application to cultivate and process marijuana for medical purposes consistent with State law. As part of the application process the local government entity must approve of the use from a zoning stand point. Nelson Township is willing to put medical marijuana cultivation and processing in their conditional use section of their C1 commercial zoning code.

C-1 District Conditional Use

3. Medical Marijuana Cultivation and Processing Facility

- a) **The facility will be located in a C1 district as an overly district purposed for medical marijuana operations.**
- b) **The addresses listed is at 12428 State Route 88 Garrettsville Ohio 44231 Associated Parcel numbers 25-007-00-00012-000 and 25-007-00-00-012-003.**
- c) **Development of the property is to be consistent with C1 lot and setback requirements.**

Staff Comments: We searched for like ordinances or examples of zoning for medical marijuana cultivation and or processing and found nothing to support such legislation. We did find however, many communities have decided to prohibit the use all together. Also that it is up to the local jurisdiction to decide how to best address medical marijuana cultivation and processing. The State is currently working on legislation to further provide guidance on the issue. So being that this type of use is in flux we recommend adding a line “d”.

- d) **Shall comply with all applicable Local, State and Federal rules and regulations**

This request is being driven by an applicant who needs local government approval to submit an application to be a potential cultivator and processor. If a license is not granted then we believe the Township may want to reconsider this as a conditional use. If the rules are relaxed and or as

new policies are established the Township may want to add distance criteria or other criteria to protect health and safety.

Staff Recommendations: Staff would recommend approval as amended.

Amendment 2

Section 901.3 Temporary Signs

Rationale: The current temporary sign code requirements for Nelson Township just speak to time, cost and bonding. This language is pretty outdated. The Township is trying to update their temporary sign code and this is their proposed language to do so.

Section 901.3 Temporary Signs

The purpose of this portion of the zoning resolution is made to allow members of the community to make the public aware of events and causes in the community.

A) Temporary signs are defined as those that announce an event that has a specific purpose AND THIS INCLUDES:

- 1. Election issues and candidates**
- 2. Garage and yard sales**
- 3. Community, church and civic events. Examples, dinners, club functions etc.**
- 4. Events such as graduations, weddings, reunions etc.**

B) Temporary signs posted near intersections may not be posted in such a way that will cause safety and visibility issues.

C) Signs will be posted no closer than 15 feet from the intersection for this reason.

D) Signs can be posted 30 days before an event and 5 days after and should be removed in this time frame by the person or group that posts them.

E) Commercial type signs advertising a sale or event may not be displayed on township property.

F) Commercial signs to include name and phone number of company posting the sign.

G) Political signs will not be placed in the surrounding 100 foot area of a polling place on the day of an election.

H) Not complying with this portion of the resolution may result in a citation being issued to the group or individuals that posted the signs.

Staff Comments: We attached the temporary sign code from Suffield Township as an example. Nelson Township may want to use a document or format similar to this as it helps with the readability of the requirements. We would also recommend coordination with the Portage County Prosecutor's Office especially with distance separation from a polling place (G) and requiring name and phone number in (F) as content may be protected as freedom of speech.

Staff Recommendation: We would recommend approval with review by the County Prosecutor's Office prior to the Trustee's approval.

- We are under contract with a consultant and are moving forward with the project. The consultant is being paid for with grant funds we received. It is hoped that the study will direct us with a variety of opportunities and possible options to pursue creating a food hub in Portage County. We had a public meeting that included producers and buyers and was held on November 30th at the Reed Memorial Library. Held a Steering Committee Meeting on March 20th. We will be presenting the final report at the next RPC Board meeting May 10th. Related submitted a grant for the next phase of the Food Hub.

14. Ravenna City Land Use Plan

- Currently collecting data and mapping key elements of the City. We met with the Mayor of Ravenna in October and are working closely with the City's "core group" to develop goals, objectives and strategies. We received feedback on the maps and survey which will be going out shortly. We want to have a community meeting on the week of June 12th.

15. Local Government Innovation Fund County-wide Parks and Receptions Collaboration and Coordination Plan.

- Portage County Regional Planning Commission received a \$50,000 grant to work with all the parks and park related facilities in the County to do the following basic tasks:
 - 1) Foster Collaboration
 - 2) Inventory all park amenities/facilities in Portage County
 - 3) Discuss opportunities for resource sharing i.e. purchase of play equipment, maintenance of equipment
 - 4) Discuss opportunities to coordinate park services i.e. leagues, events and other social activities,
 - 5) Compile facility and programming information to share for each community and a master list to be provided on-line for public use.
- A steering committee meeting was held on March 2nd at the RPC office. Next meeting is scheduled for May 4th.
